"Materials cannot tell their own stories,"



writes Tova Mellen in the foreward to "Beholding the Past," *Chebacco* vol. 19. "Collection and preservation of historical materials are the means but not the end to our work." An integral part of our mission is to provide opportunities for the public to plumb the depths of our shared archives and to discover connections between places, people, and events in local and national history. In this year's magazine, we invited authors around the island to tell the stories of fourteen unique objects of island history, accompanied by stunning full-color photographs by Jennifer Steen Booher.

Engagement

One of our most beloved events for young historians, the Vintage Classroom is a living history play set in the Sound Schoolhouse in the year 1895. Actors play characters based on real historical figures and discuss events in the village's past, providing participants with an immersive introduction to 19th century schooling and life on Mount Desert Island.

Our Development Coordinator, Eloise Schultz, shares that "Not only students gain a sense of the differences between then and now, but they observe cultural values which are still very important for our communities today." With support from the Maine Humanities Council and Maine Arts Commission, this year's Vintage Classroom was offered for free to the public and reached a total audience of 141 students, teachers, and community members. Keep an ear tuned for more voices of local history in future iterations of this dynamic program!

Visitors can see many of the objects in this year's *Chebacco* at the Somesville Museum this summer. Our new exhibit, *Beholdings*, considers the power of artifacts of all types to expand our understanding of this place and its people. Objects, photographs, and a web portal tell the stories behind an early twentieth-century community cookbook, bird specimens collected by Henry Spelman in the 1880s, and fragments of 200-year-old shoes concealed in the parsonage house of Great Cranberry Island, and much more.


Financial Report

In 2017, the society generated a net profit from operations with revenues of \$657,320 and expenses of \$589,000. The significant incremental revenue and expenses in 2017 from prior years represent a very generous but non-recurring grant from the Charles Butt Foundation to underwrite the initial planning phases of the History Trust. This grant also enabled in part the salaries for two new employees, our Development Coordinator and Curator of Collections. In addition, last year's membership levels rose to an unprecedented 638 active members and families. Seventy-five percent of our members reside here in Maine, and the remaining quarter are spread across 28 other states in the US.

Statement from the Treasurer:

In the fall of 2017, we engaged the Accounting firm Horton, McFarland, & Vesey, LLC to conduct an audit of the Society's financial reporting and processes. The auditors gave the Society a satisfactory overall rating, which included a summary financial report and specific recommendations to management on actions to be taken in the future to assure financial controls remain in place.

Collaborate with neighboring museums and community members on public events such as the winter Bean Supper and the mid-summer Strawberry Festival.


Publish contemporary historical research and essays in our annual magazine, Chebacco.
